Here is an example of a completed course request sheet. Notice how each block is filled in, along with a few elective alternates. This sheet must be completed prior to your scheduling meeting with a school counselor.

SCHEDULE REQUEST SHEET

When filling in the chart, remember these points:

- You should NOT leave a spot for lunch – it will be scheduled automatically
- Add Study Hall in the blank(s) if you want study hall
- Consider Art, Business, Family & Consumer Science, Industrial Tech., Performing Arts, and World Language classes as possible electives.
- If you request Early Release/Late Arrival, you must bring a signed permission form to your scheduling meeting.



When filling in the schedule course request sheet, please keep in mind a few things:

- You should not add a place for lunch as lunch will automatically be added to your schedule.
- Having a studyhall in your schedule can provide a brain break in your school day and possibly allow you to make up tests and meet with your teachers. It is highly suggested for sophomores to request a study hall for both semesters.
- We are fortunate to offer a myriad of electives in art, business, family & consumer sciences, industrial technology, performing arts, and world language, so be sure to look into taking some of these courses.
- If you are requesting an early release or late arrival, then you must bring in a signed permission form to your scheduling meeting. This will take the place of your studyhall. This form can be found in student services or on Liberty school website.

SCHEDULE REQUEST SHEET

IMPORTANT:

- Colleges want to see a rigorous, challenging curriculum that continues throughout your high school career!
- Athletes must be passing a minimum of 5 classes per quarter in order to be eligible to participate in athletics.
 - PE/Conditioning and/or AP Science Labs cannot count as one of the five classes.
 - Recommended that Student-Athletes enroll in six courses



For students who are planning to attend college after graduating high school, it is important to note that colleges want to see a rigorous, challenging curriculum.

For student-athletes, please be aware that you must be passing at least five classes per quarter in order to be eligible to participate in athletics. Physical Education (in person or online) and AP Science labs do not count as one of the five required classes. We highly recommend student athletes to be enrolled in at least six classes.

THE SCHEDULING PROCESS

Scheduling Conference

- Every student will meet with a counselor for a scheduling conference.
- Students must bring their COMPLETED Student Course Request Sheet with the FINAL requests filled in.
- 8th Graders will schedule:
 - Hyatts MS – January 21st
 - Liberty MS – January 24th
- 9th Grade – January 18th - 20th
- 10th Grade – January 25th - 28th
- 11th Grade – January 31st - February 2nd
- CCP/Makeups – February 3rd - 11th

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Each student will meet with a school counselor to enter their requests. As a reminder, student's schedule request sheets should be completed prior to this meeting.

Hyatts 8th graders will meet on January 21st

Liberty 8th graders will meet on January 24th.

Freshmen will meet in their world history class on January 18th through 20th.

Sophomores will meet in their biology class on January 25th through 28th.

Juniors will meet in their english class on January 31st through February 2nd.

CCP and absent students will meet on February 3rd - 11th. Look for more information about how to sign up for a specific date and time through SingupGenius.

- If interested in getting to AP Calculus BC - you should double up with Honors Geometry and Honors Algebra II
- It is NOT RECOMMENDED to do ONLINE courses to advance - **only for remediation**

Teacher Academy is also available to junior and seniors and is similar to Mentorship, except it specializes in the field of education. Students who would like to explore being a future educator and gain student teaching experience should apply for this program. This is a year long course.

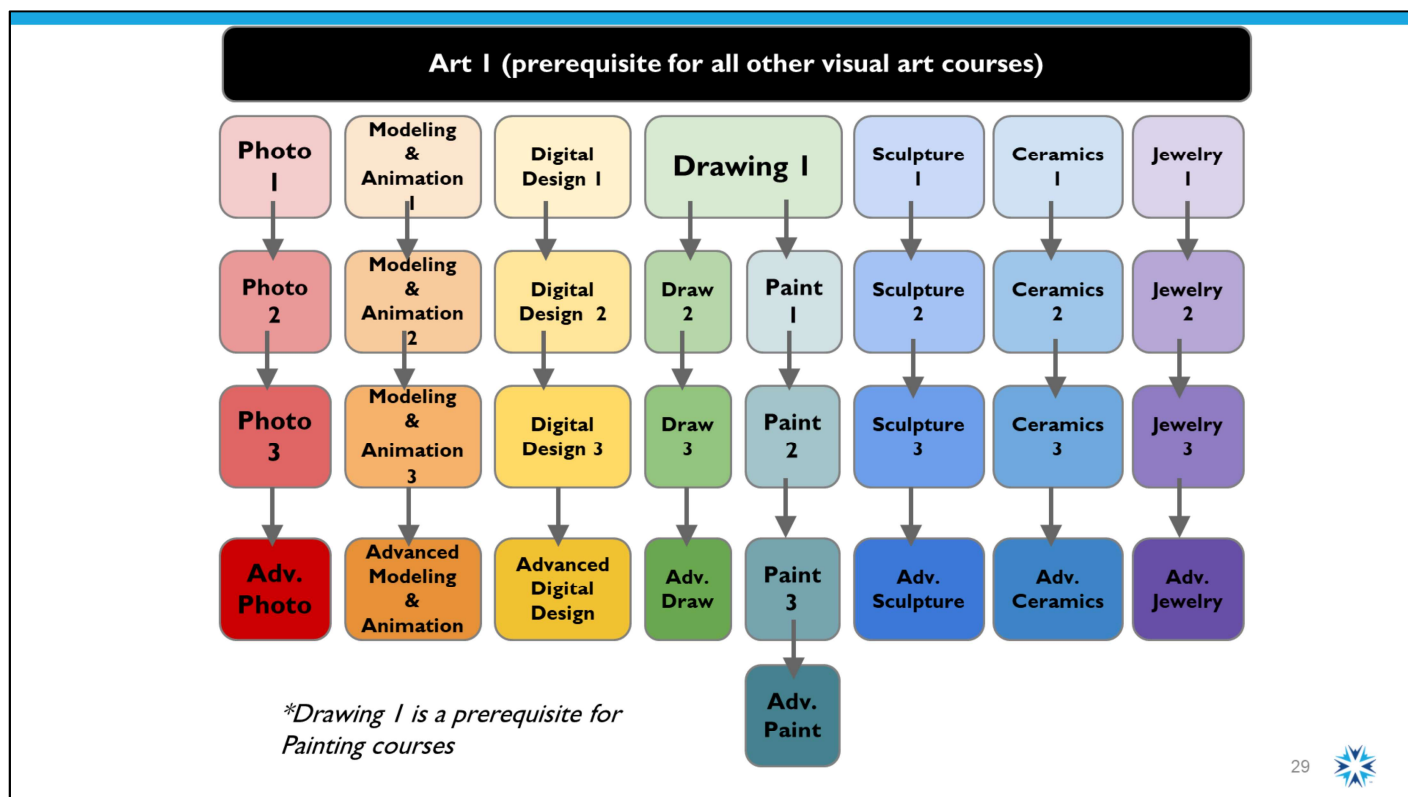

At Liberty, we pride ourselves on developing our students with a 504 plan or an IEP into self advocates and supporting these students throughout their high school career.

INTERVENTION DEPARTMENT

Intervention Study Center (ISC) or Guided Study Center

- Instead of Studyhall, students on a 504 or IEP will be scheduled for one period of ISC or GSH
- Specially designed support services in completing daily assignments, homework, study skills, and working towards IEP goals



Each intervention specialist works with students on their caseload for four years and provides support to students in their Intervention Study Center or Guided Study Center.

OTHER EDUCATIONAL OPTIONS

Performing Arts Auditions

- What if I want to take a course that requires an audition (like choir, band, or orchestra)?
 - Place the course on the Schedule Request sheet
 - Talk with the specific teacher about when the auditions will take place.



For some band, choir, and orchestra classes, an audition is required. Please talk to these specific teachers about when the auditions will take place and write the class on the course request sheet.

OTHER EDUCATIONAL OPTIONS

PE and Health

- Offered during the school year or in the summer as in-person or online classes
- For online or summer classes, place these requests in the “Comments” section

PE Waiver

- Successful completion of two seasons of school athletics, marching band, cheerleading, show choir, or two years of ROTC

Credit Flex

- Applications available online. Student takes ownership to learn course content on their own by creating plan to demonstrate the student’s attainment of the required knowledge, then course credit is given.
- Applications must be submitted by May 1st.



Physical Education is a required graduation class that is offered in our building as an in-person or online class. When requesting online PE, please use the correct course code. Place this request in the “Comments” section of your course request sheet. Online PE is also offered over the summer for a fee. Registration for summer PE is usually available in March.

Students may meet the Physical Education graduation requirement if they successfully complete two seasons of the following: school athletics, marching band, cheerleading, show choir, or two years of ROTC.

Another option for students to earn credits is through credit flex. Students may be able to credit flex courses by designing their own learning plan. More information about credit flex plans can be found on the Liberty school website

DELAWARE AREA CAREER CENTER

- Priority deadline is January 14th, 2022
- Students are able to attend the DACC for a Full or Half day, depending on the lab that they participate in
- Students attending the DACC, can still participate in Liberty extracurricular activities (clubs, athletics, the arts)
- Apply through an online application at the DACC website



The Delaware Area Career Center is another great opportunity for students to explore a career that they may be interested in. Students can attend the DACC as a half or full day. By participating in a lab at the DACC, students earn elective credits that are meaningful for them, gain future career knowledge, and may be able to earn college credits and/or job certifications. Rising juniors should apply on the DACC website as most of their programs are for two years. There is a Pharmacy Tech program that only rising seniors should apply for.

COLLEGE CREDIT PLUS

- The opportunity to take a class to earn high school credit and guaranteed college credit that would transfer to any public college/university in Ohio.
- Transportation is on your own (travel time built into schedule)
- May 1st deadline - intent to participate
- Any college coursework is weighted coursework (5.0 scale) like AP classes. Any grade earned will be reflected on your high school transcript.
- You will earn 1 high school credit for any college class that is 3 credits or more. This meets athletic eligibility requirements.
- If you fail a CCP course, then you will be required to pay for it.
- Please check with your school counselor for eligibility requirements.



College Credit Plus is an opportunity for students to take a college level course and receive high school and college credits. Transportation is on your own and travel time is built into your schedule. Please check with your school counselor for eligibility requirements. Students must complete the intent to participate form by May 1st. This document is found on the school's website and in student services. It should then be turned into a student's counselor. It's important to note that any college coursework is weighted coursework (5.0 scale) like AP classes. Any grade earned will be reflected on your high school transcript. If you fail a CCP course, then you will be required to pay for it. Students will earn 1 high school credit for any college class that is 3 credits or more.

ADDITIONAL SCHEDULING INFORMATION

Early Release/Late Arrival

- Plan for this period on your request sheet
- Pick-up the parent permission paperwork, which can be found in Student Services
- Bring SIGNED parent permission paperwork to your scheduling meeting with your counselor

Honors & AP Courses

- An Honors/AP course provides the student with additional depth and rigor in the subject.
- Talk with your child's teacher about his/her recommendation
- Students should challenge themselves with an honors course if they have an interest and/or aptitude for the subject



Here is a little more information about early release/late arrivals. These out periods must be written on a student's course request sheet. If a student is requesting an early release or late arrival, then they must bring in a signed permission form to their scheduling meeting. This form can be found in student services or on Liberty's school website.

It should be noted that Honors and AP courses are yearlong commitments that are time consuming. Be mindful when scheduling a number of these courses and think about how much time is spent on extracurricular activities and part time jobs.

ADDITIONAL SCHEDULING INFORMATION

What if my child changes his/her mind and wants a change to the schedule request?

- 8th Grade:
 - PRIOR to May 1st: Please contact your child's **middle school** school counselor to make the necessary adjustments.
 - ON or AFTER May 1st: Contact your student's **high school guidance counselor** at (740) 657-4215
- 9th – 11th Grade: Contact school counselor by March 4th



After their scheduling their meeting, students should contact their school counselor to make any changes to their request. 8th grade students should contact their middle school counselor up until May 1st. After this date, then they should contact their high school counselor.
